# **Better Together – Heb 13:1-3**

<sup>1</sup>Let brotherly love continue. <sup>2</sup>Do not forget to entertain strangers, for by so doing some have unwittingly entertained angels. <sup>3</sup>Remember the prisoners as if chained with them—those who are mistreated—since you yourselves are in the body also.

### Verse 1. Love One Another

<sup>1</sup> Let brotherly love continue.

- Love = Philadelphia
- Brother = fellow believers
- Mutual affection
- Loving one another as brothers and sisters
- Keep showing love and kindness.
- **John 13:34-35** A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. <sup>35</sup> By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."
- 1 Cor 13 further defines this well, verses 4-8
- <sup>4</sup>Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant <sup>5</sup> or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; <sup>6</sup> it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. <sup>7</sup>Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. <sup>8</sup>Love never ends.
- **1 John 3:10** By this it is evident who are the children of God, and who are the children of the devil: whoever does not practice righteousness is not of God, nor is the one who does not love his brother.

- Romans 13:8 Owe no one anything, except to love each other, for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law
- Better together as we can experience the love of Christ through each other!

#### Verse 2. Share with each other.

<sup>2</sup>Do not forget to entertain strangers, for by so doing some have unwittingly entertained angels.

- We are better together as we can share with each other. Sharing life is a
  privilege. Specifically with fellow believers. To be of one mind, one voice, one
  spirit. We are one body.
- "Entertain strangers" (philoxenia) = treating someone you don't know, generously in the context of one's home
- There is blessing when we participate in facilitating the gospel. I do believe unexpected blessings follows willing and obedient acts of hospitality.
- We are better together as we can share life with each other!

## Verse 3. Remember your brothers and sisters.

<sup>3</sup> Remember the prisoners as if chained with them—those who are mistreated—since you yourselves are in the body also.

- "Remember" = keep present in one's thoughts = to actively serve one another
- "Remembering" = acting in response to a brother or sister's needs. We need to be highly aware of others. We do so by remembering we are also chained with them.

- Here, the writer reminds the early church to "remember those who are in prison", often fellow Christians imprisoned for their faith.
- Previous chapter Heb 10:32-34 affirms this. <sup>32</sup> But recall the former days when, after you were enlightened, you endured a hard struggle with sufferings, <sup>33</sup> sometimes being publicly exposed to reproach and affliction, and sometimes being partners with those so treated. <sup>34</sup> For you had compassion on those in prison, and you joyfully accepted the plundering of your property, since you knew that you yourselves had a better possession and an abiding one.
- **2 Tim 1:15-18** <sup>15</sup> You are aware that all who are in Asia turned away from me, among whom are **Phygelus and Hermogenes**. <sup>16</sup> May the Lord grant mercy to the household of **Onesiphorus**, for he often refreshed me and was not ashamed of my chains, <sup>17</sup> but when he arrived in Rome he searched for me earnestly and found me— <sup>18</sup> may the Lord grant him to find mercy from the Lord on that day!—and you well know all the service he rendered at Ephesus.
- Paul highly commended Onesiphorus for his brother love, "was not ashamed of my chains," highlights how crucial it was to "remember those is prison", even for an apostle.
- Yet, in remembering those in prison, those mistreated and practicing hospitality, equates to visiting and serving Christ. This is the application for us, we are better together as we serve each other:
- Matthew 25:35-40 <sup>35</sup> For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, <sup>36</sup> I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.' <sup>37</sup> Then the righteous will answer him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? <sup>38</sup> And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? <sup>39</sup> And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' <sup>40</sup> And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.'
- Better together so we can actively serve one another!

## Conclusion

- 1. **Better together** as we can experience the love of Christ through each other, we are called to love one another.
- 2. **Better together** as we can share life with each other, we are called to be hospitable to one another.
- 3. **Better together** so we can actively serve one another, we are called to remember each other.
